
BOOSTER CLUB NEWS





On March 19th, Black Hawk hosted the Six Rivers Conference Mathematics Contest. This is the 3rd year that the competition has included all 14 schools from the Six Rivers East and West conferences. The competition was held in Juda for the 1st 15 years for the Six Rivers East. This competition tested nearly 250 competitors' basic computational skills, problem-solving abilities, critical thinking, and ingenuity. Each Mathlete took 3 tests: an individual mental math test (20 seconds/question without the use of a calculator, paper, or pencil), an individual math test (no calculators allowed), and a team test.

Black Hawk took 4th place this year as a team. While all of the participants from Black Hawk did well, a few members of our team performed exceedingly well.

Alexis Stietz (Sophomore- JV), Josslyn Lewis (8th Grade-JV), Maddy Place (10th Grade-V) Keira Brunner (11th Grade-V) and Beau Bredeson (12th Grade-V) scored enough points to be placed on the 2nd Team All-Conference team.

Alyvia Ruegsegger (11th Grade-V) had a solid performance and earned 1st Team All-Conference Honors.

We are excited to introduce the **School To Work (STW) and Youth Apprenticeship (YA) programs** for the 2025-26 academic year. These programs are designed to provide high school juniors and seniors with valuable hands-on employment experience in a career pathway of their choice. The programs serves as a bridge between classroom learning and real-world application, helping students make informed decisions about their future careers.

Program Overview

- Students gain work experience in local businesses or within family-owned businesses.
- Students may work up to four class periods per school day
- Students working **four or more hours after school** may apply for a waiver to start their school day later.
- Participation requires meeting specific requirements and regulations outlined below.

STW/YA Program Requirements

- 1. Signed consent from a parent/guardian, School To Work Coordinator, principal, and school counselor.
- 2. Submission of required paperwork (Student Registration and Training Agreement).
- 3. Weekly submission of work hours, signed by the employer.
- 4. Completion of a quarterly Employment Core Values document with reflections.
- 5. Quarterly employer evaluation on employability skills.
- 6. Maintain a minimum 2.0 GPA (C average).
- 7. Three consecutive weeks of academic ineligibility will result in removal from the program.
- 8. YA students may work up to 4 class periods
- 9. STW students may only work up to 2 class periods per day.
- 10. Students may not remain **unemployed for more than two weeks**.
- 11. A minimum of **10 work hours per week** is required.
- 12. Students must maintain **passing grades** in both STW coursework and employment evaluations.
- 13. Only one in-school or out-of-school suspension per semester is allowed.
- 14. Good hygiene must be practiced, especially for students working in physically demanding environments.
- 15. Submission of **all required paperwork before the first day of school** is recommended.
- 16. Students cannot be terminated from employment to remain in the program.

Youth Apprenticeship Additional Requirements

- Students must complete 450 hours of work between September 1 and the following school year.
- Students must complete 180 hours of related instruction in their career area.
- Related instruction should align with the student's career pathway (e.g., an agriculture student taking AG classes).

After School Work Hours & Attendance Waivers

Students who work **three or more hours in the evening** may apply for a **Waiver of Attendance** to adjust their school schedule. Upon school board approval, students may **miss up to four class periods** to accommodate their work schedules.

Class/Work Experience & Job Shadowing

- **Class/Work Experience:** Students obtain off-campus employment in a career-related field. These hours count toward the STW/YA program requirements.
- **Job Shadowing:** Students gain exposure to their career interests by volunteering and observing professionals in their chosen field. This experience helps develop essential work skills, responsibility, and communication.

Curriculum Overview

First Semester

- 1. **Career Exploration & Preparation:** Resume building, job applications, interview preparation, and professional communication skills.
- 2. Business Placement: Students work in local businesses relevant to their career interests.
- 3. **Business Development:** Guidance for students interested in starting a business or contributing to a family business.
- 4. Continuous Evaluation: Regular assessments, reflections, and goal setting.

Second Semester

- 1. **New Student Integration:** Late-joining students follow the first-semester curriculum for seamless transition.
- 2. Career Exploration Continuation: Students may switch jobs to explore different career interests.
- 3. **Soft Skills Workshop:** In collaboration with CESA 3 and Lafayette County Advisory Council, students develop essential workplace skills such as communication and interview techniques.

Youth Apprenticeship (YA) Overview

YA is a **one or two-year** apprenticeship program for high school juniors and seniors. Students gain **real-world job experience** while continuing their high school education and receiving industry-related instruction.

YA Program Structure

- Level One: Junior or Senior Year
 - \circ 450 work hours minimum
 - 2 semesters of related coursework
- Level Two: Junior & Senior Year
 - 900 work hours minimum
 - 4 semesters of related coursework

YA Career Pathways

The YA program offers opportunities in **11 career clusters**, including:

- Agriculture, Food & Natural Resources
- Architecture & Construction
- Arts, A/V Technology & Communication
- Finance
- Health Sciences
- Hospitality, Lodging & Tourism
- Information Technology
- Manufacturing
- Marketing
- Science, Technology, Engineering & Math
- Transportation, Distribution & Logistics

Required Forms & Deadlines

To streamline the process, the following forms must be submitted:

- 1. Youth Apprenticeship Registration Form Captures initial student interest.
- 2. Youth Apprenticeship Employment Training Agreement Confirms the student's commitment to the program.

All training agreements must be submitted by February 2, 2024 to CESA 3.

Related Instruction

Students must take **two semesters of related coursework** each year. Courses may be taken at **local high schools or two/four-year institutions**, with **CESA 3 covering up to 6 credits per year** (pre-approval required).

Fall 2025 Dual Credit course enrollment through Colleged Up or Smart College Now will be due on March 7. Ms. Crotty has application forms. There will be a meeting on February 27 for sophomores and juniors highlighting the programs and application process. Students who wish to be in Youth Apprenticeship next year, will also need to look at the course lists and go through the process of looking for course(s) related to their career pathway to submit to Mr. Cooley.

We are thrilled to offer these incredible learning opportunities and look forward to supporting our students as they take steps toward their future careers. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us.



School District of Black Hawk Regular Board Meeting February 18, 2025



The board meeting was called to order in the District Conference Room by President Dee Paulson at 6:10 pm the following board members were present Dee Paulson, Jim Baumgartner, Clayton Ruegsegger, Val Dunlavey, Cali Schliem and Jason Figi .Absent was Mindy Stauffacher. Also present was the administration of Willy Chambers, Cory Milz, Tammy Zimmerman and 3 guests.

Motion by Baumgartner and seconded by Schliem to consent to agenda which includes meeting notice, minutes from the January 8, 2025 meeting and the financial report. The motion carried on a voice vote.

Administration Report:

Chambers:

Construction Comments:

-Cory Zimmerly painted required firewall labels above the drop ceilings.

-The lower 20" of the wall at the bottom of the steps leading into the gym will be epoxied with flakes this week.

-Three locks need to be completed.

-Door closures on both sides of the vestibules between the Ag building and the new hallway need to be installed.

-Some cove base installation needs to be completed

-We are working with Ben Boss to schedule the replacement of the flooring in Ms. Wolff's room to see how the new product fairs. The rest will be scheduled for summer.

-Some trim where new construction connects to old needs to be completed. Some work was done on this work yesterday.

I joined Mike Beighley at the UW-Platteville vs. UW-La Crosse men's basketball game. Besides watching the game we spent a significant time discussing how they are piloting an Artificial Intelligence assisted instructional approach. He invited me up to observe and ask questions about their implementation. I plan to do so.

I am still working on getting bids on the HVAC system maintenance. We have received one bid at this point.

I am working on getting liability insurance bids.

I am also working on getting bids for itinerate services for our special needs children.

I was out on the 17th to assist my mother with some issues related to the death of my dad.

We will hold a meeting for the public to discuss the potential spring sports cooperatives.

Mr. Milz shared with me that there are 13 out of 26 seniors who are significantly short on community service hours. It may be they just need to turn in the paperwork, we will keep you updated.

Milz:

-Congratulations to Russel Ruegsegger, the BH Middle School Scripps Spelling Bee champion. Russel competed at the CESA 3 Regional Scripps Spelling Bee in Fennimore on February 5. Easton Larse was the runner-up. -This past week, the Future Business Leaders of America organization, held activities to raise student awareness of their organization and the principles that it stands for.

-FFA Week is scheduled for the week of 2/17. The FFA officer team has planned various activities to raise student awareness of their organization and to celebrate membership in the FFA. FFA breakfast is scheduled for February 16, 2025 at the South Wayne Fire House.

-Middle school Valentine's Dance is coming up on Friday, Feb. 14. We want to thank Ms.Kammes and the M. S. student council and the members of the Parent's Club for providing all other decorations, beverages, and snacks for our middle school students.

-We want to thank the elementary room parents and the members of the Parent's Club for sponsoring our elementary Valentine's Day parties, which are taking place on Feb. 14.

-On Feb. 25, Brian Kenney will be working with our freshman students on team-building activities to try and help students build stronger class relationships and enhance their communication skills with one another.
-Forensics season is underway. The participants will be competing at sub-districts at Darlington on Monday, February 17. We have 8 female and 1 male participant on the forensics team this year. Mrs. Sheila Bredeson is the coach.

-Freshman, sophomores, and juniors will begin registering for 2025-2026 classes the week of February 24. Middle school won't register until April, with my annual 8th grade (incoming freshman) meeting taking place in May.

-Gary Cooley will be meeting with juniors and sophomores to discuss the requirements for 2025-26 Youth Apprenticeships/concentrators, and School to Work programming on March 4. One change being proposed is that students will need to be fully designated as Youth Apprenticeship participants to be out of school for 4 periods. Work release programming will allow up to 2 periods. This aligns itself with CESA 3's recommendations and other local school districts' programming. It also will increase the number of students qualifying for Black Hawk H.S. for C.T.E. (Career and Technical Education) grant funding.

-Black Hawk H.S. will be the site of the Six Rivers Math Competition. This tentatively set for March 19, and will involve over a 100 guest students in the building on that day. Logistics are in the planning stages.

-February included two staff appreciation recognition days. School Counselor Appreciation Day was on February 3 and School Bus Driver Appreciation Day is on February 24.

-Mr. Duff-Bowers took six students to CESA 3 for instruction on becoming Sources of Strength peer leaders. Sources of Strength is a program in which students lead other students on how to deal with stress and adversity. Categories of awareness to bring about support are: Family Support – Positive Friends - Mentors - Generosity - Spirituality - Physical Health - Mental Health.

-High school student council is sponsoring a high school ski trip activity for February 26.

-We have two teacher committees that have been working on two school improvement items. I tasked the two committees to come up with solutions to address our academic performances at the middle school and high school levels. English Language Arts committee and Grading committee. The main scope of these teams' missions were to address grade level rigor oversight, alignment of curriculum with WI state standards, student academic time on task. I have summarized their recommendations for presentation and have submitted them for review to the district administrator. Board of Education report – Information was obtained by board members at the State Convention regarding the use of AI platforms and how they can be used to help increase efficiencies in schools. Several schools are using Brisk for AI. The district is currently experimenting using Brisk and learning what the capabilities of this program are.

Public comment section: Tonya Milz presented information regarding the live streaming of school board meetings. She discussed that many things could be positive such as community members could gain a better understanding of the information discussed at meetings. She also showed information on an area school district's number of views of some of their recent live streaming of board meetings.

Discussion items:

Live streaming – We talked about the pros and cons. Paulson did reach out to the school's attorney and the attorney stated the streaming would have to have ADA closed caption programming. Our attorney states there is not any law that states we do have to do live streaming of meetings. There would also be some setup costs, and we would need to set up a dedicated space. Attendance by the public at our meetings is very low. There is also concern about AI manipulation of the meeting recordings.

AGR Report was presented by Chambers

Food Service talked about how much food is thrown away and see about combining with other schools to have an outside vendor manage and or take over. Some vendors could take over foodservice and others could take over and keep our staff. Many options to look at to better the program going forward. Quality of school food could be better. Lots of prepackaged food is served here. Asking for a fact sheet from cooks to track what is happening.

Before and After School care went over what Dodgeville currently is doing and had information presented about hiring an outside vendor to manage the program. Questions around it include staffing, hours or operation and rooms to use.

FBLA School Store/Entre/DECA Mr. Behlke talked about the program and how it will be changing in the near future. Documents were also attached for the Board to review.

The Board Summary of State Convention went around the table and members highlighted the goods from the Convention. It was perceived as a very good time with information and networking with other schools. It was also brought up that we limit the number going based on cost to the District,
