



2026-2027 Budget - Impending Referendum

Currently we do not know what the 2026-2027 Black Hawk School District budget will look like. Actually, we truly do not know what the 2025-2026 budget will look like. We had to make some educated estimates with respect to some pieces of the puzzle to come up with a number for the April 1, 2025 referendum. I am confident that the district will be coming back to the community again in the 2026 calendar year asking for the approval of an operational referendum.

A result of influences outside of local control, the Black Hawk community will need to consider an operational referendum in 2026. Some of those factors include the following. What will the legislature approve for school funding for the 2025-2027 biennial budget? Will the legislature raise the low revenue limit to 12,000 in the first year with an additional amount for the second year, which would greatly benefit the district? Will they increase the special education reimbursement? Will other categorical aids increase? Each piece can and will affect what the district may ask the community to support in an operational referendum in 2026.

Other pieces of the puzzle that will affect the funds requested of the community will include factors such as enrollment, open-enrollment, homeschool numbers, cost of utilities, and cost of outsourced services. The district is looking at ideas that may affect open-enrollment and homeschool numbers, but the results of those measures are uncertain. Costs of utilities and outsourced services are mostly out of control of the district, even though when these costs can be bid out they are. Cutting opportunities for students is another option to potentially reduce financial needs for the district.

With so many unknowns, I cannot speak to specific numbers or needs at this time. I am certain that the system has left it up to local control to provide the funding the community feels is appropriate for its version of a quality education. I am confident that it is essential to start conversations now on what the community wants to offer students, and how those choices will affect the community as a whole.

I welcome community members to engage in discussions about your school district. What can be done better to serve the students, what is done well, what can be done more efficiently, and what are the essential functions of a school district.

Measles Information for Schools and Childcare Providers

With measles cases on the rise across the U.S.—including three deaths—it's more important than ever to protect your students, staff, and families from this highly contagious disease. As of April 10, 2025, the CDC has reported 712 measles cases in the United States. At the time we are sending this letter, no measles cases have been reported in Wisconsin this year.

There is more measles activity because fewer people are getting the MMR vaccine. The CDC recommends that 95% of people in a community are vaccinated against measles to prevent the spread of the disease effectively. In Green County, only 76% of children ages 5-6 are fully immunized against measles, which is a cause for concern.

Measles is highly contagious and can spread before symptoms appear. It is not seasonal but spreads more easily during periods of high travel. Children under 5 and adults over 20 are most at risk for serious illness when they are not vaccinated.

What You Should Know About Measles

- Measles symptoms include fever, cough, runny nose, red eyes, sore throat, and a rash that spreads over the body.
- An infected person can spread measles from 4 days before the rash appears to 4 days after.
- Quarantine for those exposed and unvaccinated lasts 21 days, which can seriously disrupt school and childcare
 operations.

How to Protect Your Students and Staff

Take These Steps Now

- Encourage staff and families to verify their or their children's MMR vaccine status
- Inform them they may need to show proof of immunity, or they will need to quarantine if exposed
- Recommend those unvaccinated or unsure of their status speak with a healthcare provider
- Reinforce good hygiene, like handwashing, covering coughs, and staying home when sick

Check Immunization Status

- The MMR (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella) vaccine is 97% effective after two doses.
- People can check their immunization records through the Wisconsin Immunization Registry (WIR).

Accepted Proof of Immunity Includes:

- Born before January 1, 1957 (Note: This does not apply to health care settings)
- One or more doses of a measles vaccine for preschool-age children and low-risk adults
- Two doses for school-age children, healthcare personnel, travelers, and college students
- A blood test showing immunity (serologic proof)
- Laboratory confirmation of prior measles illness

SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION 2024-2025 SCHOOL YEAR

Under AHERA (Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act), all primary and secondary schools are required to develop and implement a plan for managing all building materials which contain asbestos. Included in the AHERA Act is the requirement to annually notify all workers and building occupants (or their guardians) of asbestos-related activities.

Beginning in 1988, all buildings owned, leased, or "under the control of" the School District were inspected by EPA accredited inspectors, with building material samples analyzed by an independent laboratory. Based on the inspection, the School District prepared and the state approved a comprehensive management plan for managing the asbestos.

Where the asbestos-containing materials are found, the District has in place an Operations and Maintenance program.

The District has accomplished the following compliance mandates regarding the administration of asbestos in school buildings:

- Environmental Management Consulting, Inc. (EMC) was contracted to be the school's consultant for asbestos for the school year.
- The District is continuing with the Operations and Maintenance Program as designed for the School District. This ensures that all asbestos materials are kept in good condition.
- Periodic "surveillance" in each area containing asbestos has been completed every six months by our consultant. Also, the buildings are re-inspected by an accredited inspector every three years.

In the past year the district conducted the following asbestos removal activities:

- Removal of asbestos from the flooring systems in the 1921 building before building demolition
- Removal of asbestos 9" tile in the main East/West Corridor and North-South Corridor of the
 1956 portion of the building
- Removal of asbestos 9" tile in rooms 14,15, and 18 in the 1956 portion of the building
- Removal of asbestos in the underlayment of the flooring system in the lower level of the 1938 building which includes rooms 35, 36, and 37 and the adjacent hallway.

We are excited to introduce the **School To Work (STW) and Youth Apprenticeship (YA) programs** for the 2025-26 academic year. These programs are designed to provide high school juniors and seniors with valuable hands-on employment experience in a career pathway of their choice. The programs serves as a bridge between classroom learning and real-world application, helping students make informed decisions about their future careers.

Program Overview

- Students gain work experience in local businesses or within family-owned businesses.
- Students may work up to **four class periods** per school day
- Students working four or more hours after school may apply for a waiver to start their school day later.
- Participation requires meeting specific requirements and regulations outlined below.

STW/YA Program Requirements

- 1. Signed consent from a parent/guardian, School To Work Coordinator, principal, and school counselor.
- 2. Submission of **required paperwork** (Student Registration and Training Agreement).
- 3. Weekly submission of work hours, signed by the employer.
- 4. Completion of a quarterly Employment Core Values document with reflections.
- 5. Quarterly employer evaluation on employability skills.
- 6. Maintain a minimum 2.0 GPA (C average).
- 7. Three consecutive weeks of academic ineligibility will result in removal from the program.
- 8. YA students may work up to 4 class periods
- 9. STW students may only work up to 2 class periods per day.
- 10. Students may not remain unemployed for more than two weeks.
- 11. A minimum of **10 work hours per week** is required.
- 12. Students must maintain **passing grades** in both STW coursework and employment evaluations.
- 13. Only one in-school or out-of-school suspension per semester is allowed.
- 14. Good hygiene must be practiced, especially for students working in physically demanding environments.
- 15. Submission of all required paperwork before the first day of school is recommended.
- 16. Students cannot be terminated from employment to remain in the program.

Youth Apprenticeship Additional Requirements

- Students must complete **450 hours of work** between September 1 and the following school year.
- Students must complete 180 hours of related instruction in their career area.
- Related instruction should align with the student's career pathway (e.g., an agriculture student taking AG classes).

After School Work Hours & Attendance Waivers

Students who work three or more hours in the evening may apply for a Waiver of Attendance to adjust their school schedule. Upon school board approval, students may miss up to four class periods to accommodate their work schedules.

Class/Work Experience & Job Shadowing

- Class/Work Experience: Students obtain off-campus employment in a career-related field. These hours count toward the STW/YA program requirements.
- Job Shadowing: Students gain exposure to their career interests by volunteering and observing professionals in their chosen field. This experience helps develop essential work skills, responsibility, and communication.

Curriculum Overview

First Semester

- 1. **Career Exploration & Preparation:** Resume building, job applications, interview preparation, and professional communication skills.
- 2. Business Placement: Students work in local businesses relevant to their career interests.
- 3. **Business Development:** Guidance for students interested in starting a business or contributing to a family business.
- 4. Continuous Evaluation: Regular assessments, reflections, and goal setting.

Second Semester

- 1. **New Student Integration:** Late-joining students follow the first-semester curriculum for seamless transition.
- Career Exploration Continuation: Students may switch jobs to explore different career interests.
- 3. **Soft Skills Workshop:** In collaboration with CESA 3 and Lafayette County Advisory Council, students develop essential workplace skills such as communication and interview techniques.

Youth Apprenticeship (YA) Overview

YA is a **one or two-year** apprenticeship program for high school juniors and seniors. Students gain **real-world job experience** while continuing their high school education and receiving industry-related instruction.

YA Program Structure

- Level One: Junior or Senior Year
 - 450 work hours minimum
 - 2 semesters of related coursework
- Level Two: Junior & Senior Year
 - o 900 work hours minimum
 - 4 semesters of related coursework

YA Career Pathways

The YA program offers opportunities in **11 career clusters**, including:

- Agriculture, Food & Natural Resources
- Architecture & Construction
- Arts, A/V Technology & Communication
- Finance
- Health Sciences
- Hospitality, Lodging & Tourism
- Information Technology
- Manufacturing
- Marketing
- Science, Technology, Engineering & Math
- Transportation, Distribution & Logistics

Required Forms & Deadlines

To streamline the process, the following forms must be submitted:

- 1. **Youth Apprenticeship Registration Form** Captures initial student interest.
- 2. **Youth Apprenticeship Employment Training Agreement** Confirms the student's commitment to the program.

All training agreements must be submitted by February 2, 2024 to CESA 3.

Related Instruction

Students must take **two semesters of related coursework** each year. Courses may be taken at **local high schools or two/four-year institutions**, with **CESA 3 covering up to 6 credits per year** (pre-approval required).

Fall 2025 Dual Credit course enrollment through Colleged Up or Smart College Now will be due on March 7. Ms. Crotty has application forms. There will be a meeting on February 27 for sophomores and juniors highlighting the programs and application process. Students who wish to be in Youth Apprenticeship next year, will also need to look at the course lists and go through the process of looking for course(s) related to their career pathway to submit to Mr. Cooley.

School District of Black Hawk Regular Board Meeting March 12, 2025



The school board meeting was called to order at 6:05 pm by President Dee Paulson in the upper commons. It was originally scheduled in the conference room but due to the fact that we had a large audience it was moved to the Upper Commons. The following members were present Jim Baumgartner, Dee Paulson, Val Dunlavey, Cali Schliem, Clayton Ruegsegger, Mindy Stauffacher and Jason Figi. Also present was the administration of Chambers, Milz, Erickson, Tammy Zimmerman and 20 guests.

Motion by Schliem and seconded by Baumgartner to consent to agenda which includes minutes from February 18, 205, financial report, and adoption of the agenda. The motion carried on a voice vote.

Administration Reports: Chambers: We have been notified that City Electric Supply Company, which contracted with JP Electric, is seeking payment of \$185,035.15, which is owed to them. This affects Sjostrom and Sons. I am making you aware of this so if you catch wind of it, you are not caught off guard. Please see the attached document.

We are working with Zac Hess to potentially secure a grant for the area to: Help prevent and reduce the initiation and progression of substance use and its related problems by supporting the development and delivery of community-based substance use prevention services that strengthen protective factors, reduce risk factors, build resilience, and promote well-being (all the good stuff). The grant currently includes Black Hawk, Albany, Juda, and Pecatonica. We are hoping to bring on a couple more schools. Please see the attached document.

I have communicated with different entities to gain access to sites to present information about the referendum. If any Board members can attend these meetings when they occur, I believe it will add some credence to the information.

- I talked to Steve Monson about the VI's back room some evening, of this meeting, it should be open for use except any Wednesday is not good, but other evenings will work.
- · I talked to Chris McGlynn about the Gratiot Village building and have received permission to use the facilities.
- · I talked to Phil Carrol about the SW Fire Department, he arranged a time for me on March 18 at 6 PM.
- I left a message for Steve Tuescher and then talked to Adam Foster about the Wiota Fire Department space.

 Steve Tuescher reached out today and I will be presenting at the Wiota Fire Department at 6 PM on March 19.
- · I talked to Jason Figi about the Cadiz Town Hall and have received permission to use the site.
- I have talked to Lauren Meinert about the Jordan Town Hall and have received permission to use the site.

I have received two bids for air conditioning in the Speech space. In this case Monroe Heat and Sheet Metal provided a significantly better bid. This is part of the construction project. Meyers had given me a rough verbal of about \$6,000. See attached bids.

In the next couple of months, I will likely bring a savings idea to you from a company called the DataWrangler. It is not cheap to engage in, but has typically allowed companies/districts to recover the investment in 3 to 6 months.

Homeland Heating and AC decided they are not ready to provide service contacts. They may be interested in the future.

The replacement of the flooring in Rachel's room will start on the 21st.

Tara Kammes, M.S. student council advisor, completed running a cookie dough fundraising effort to continue to raise funds for middle school related activities, such as the annual ski trip and incentive activities for 4th and 5th grades. We want to thank her for continuing the work that needs to be done to continue what has become a tradition here at Black Hawk Middle School. Ms. Kammes rewarded the top sellers by taking them to Sherrel Jean's diner for malts and sundaes.
- 2. Thanks to the FFA officer team, their parents, and others for organizing and hosting the annual FFA Pancake Breakfast on Feb. 16. Our officer team did an outstanding job organizing activities and events for FFA week.
- 3. Elementary staff hosted for students during the week of March 4 8, Read Across America Week, a spring fling for the elementary students. Each day was a different dress up day and reading challenge for our students. High school students were paired up with elementary students for some collaborative reading.
- 4. - 5. Juniors completed the ACT test on Tues., March 11. Thank you to the village and SW fire dept. for letting us use the fire station as a testing center. Freshmen and sophomores will be taking the Pre-ACT beginning April 1, middle school and 3rd-4th with the Forward Exam beginning March 31. 4K-3rd grade, also will do another quarterly AIMSWeb testing to look at growth in accordance with ACT 20 legislation.

- C. MS teachers have been using IXL to address the middle school students' gaps in WI standards during Flex.

I believe they are planning a pre-performance dinner at 5:00 p.m. on the 4th. Would like to thank Mr. Duff-Bowers, Mr. Amweg for their work in preparing our students for this performance. Students are working very hard right now, putting in some long days, we are proud of their efforts. Also, I would like to thank Ms. Tara Kammes and Mr. Gary Cooley for assisting with set design.
- 9. Freshmen juniors have registered for 2024-2025 classes. I am currently working on the schedule for next school year, and planning on current levels of staffing.

- 10. FFA Easter Egg Hunt is scheduled for this Saturday, April 5, 2025. They will use ½ of the gym and hope for good weather.
- 11. Thank you and welcome to Chris Ruegsegger, who will be working as a long term substitute teacher in 5K. I feel the district is very lucky to have someone of her qualifications filling this position.
- 12. Melissa Pickett was chosen by her peers as the Feb. Employee of the Month. Melissa does an outstanding job in her regularly scheduled position but also is not hesitant to jump in and lend a hand where needed with a positive, friendly attitude. She is a big part of continuing the Warrior Backpack program along with Tiffany/Travis Signer and many volunteers from the Parent's Club.
