

On October 1st, the 10th-grade class went on a field trip to Monroe High School for the **PARTY program** presented by SSM Health. The PARTY program is a preventative program for 10th graders as they begin to obtain their driver's license. PARTY stands for Prevent Alcohol and Risk Related Trauma in Youth. The program consisted of high school students acting out a scenario of peer pressure and making choices. The students acted out a situation where they were drinking and using prescription medication. One youth received a phone call from their parents requesting they

come home. Peer pressure set in and the teens had to make a choice, call for a ride from a responsible adult or ride with a friend who was under the influence. The program conducted a mock car accident, the death of one student, one seriously injured and the driver being arrested. The Monroe Police Department, Monroe Fire Department, Coroner, SSM medical providers (ER staff, nurses and other staff), Green County Judge and two individuals who shared their personal life story and the negative effects that alcohol and drugs had on their life. This may have been being arrested, serving time in jail/prison, going in and out of rehab and how their poor choices have impacted their future relationships with friends and family and abilities to obtain employment. The program showed the youth what happens from the accident, through the ER, families members being told their child was injured or worse, going through the court system and being sentenced to jail/prison time.

The program is to prevent risky behavior in youth and for them to see this can happen to anyone at any time. At the conclusion of the program SSM Health presented keys to the students (KEYS -  $\underline{K}$ eep  $\underline{E}$ veryone  $\underline{Y}$ ou love  $\underline{S}$ afe) and a contact for life. The contract for life is an agreement a minor can enter into with a trusted adult. The deal is the trusted adult will come and pick up the youth at any time, under any circumstances, no questions asked. The goal of the contact is to keep the youth safe if in a situation that they are not feeling safe. It was to tell youth that we know you may get into an unsafe situation but that your parents would rather be upset at your choices but happy you are alive and well.



#### D is for Drone

On Friday, September 26th, twenty students attended the Wisconsin Educational Fair (WEF) on the UW-Platteville campus. At the WEF, students were able to walk around and gather information for over 60 post-secondary institutions. All the UW Systems were in attendance. There was a broad representation from 4-year colleges, 2-year colleges, military and financial aid programming. Students walked about to post-secondary tables and talked with the representative and had a barcode they could scan to give particular institutions their personal information. Afterwards, UWP provided a self guided tour competition using Goosechase. Students split into teams and attempted to complete the tasks. It was a great academic and career experience for students to begin their post-secondary planning.

## HAND, FOOT, & MOUTH DISEASE FACT SHEET

#### What is Hand Foot Mouth Disease?

Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease (HFMD) is an illness caused by different viruses. It is more common for people to get HFMD during the spring, summer and fall months. Coxsackievirus A16 is the most common cause of HFMD.

#### Who can get HFMD?

Anyone. However, infants and children younger than 5 years old are most often affected. When someone gets HFMD they develop protection against the specific virus that caused their infection. Because HFMD is caused by several different viruses, people can get the disease more than once.

#### What are the signs and symptoms of HFMD?

Early symptoms of HFMD include fever, sore throat, reduced appetite, and a feeling of being unwell. One to two days after the fever starts, painful sores may develop in the mouth. A skin rash with red spots and sometimes with blisters may develop on the palms of hands, soles of the feet, knees, elbows, buttocks or genital area. Not everyone will get all of these symptoms. Some people, especially adults, may show no symptoms at all.

#### How soon do symptoms appear?

Symptoms usually begin 3-7 days after becoming infected.

#### How does HFMD spread?

Viruses that cause HFMD can be found in an infected person's nose and throat secretions (such as saliva, sputum, or nasal mucus), blister fluid, and stool. HFMD is spread from an infected person to others through the following ways:

- Close personal contact (such as kissing)
- The air (through coughing and sneezing),
- Contact with feces, including swallowing recreational water contaminated with feces
- Contact with contaminated objects and surfaces

A person is most contagious during the first week of the illness, but can be contagious for weeks after symptoms go away. People without symptoms can still spread the virus. HFMD is not transmitted to or from pets or other animals.

#### How is HFMD diagnosed?

A health care provider can diagnose HFMD by considering the age of the patient, the symptoms, and the appearance of the rash and mouth sores during examination. Depending on symptom severity, samples from the throat or stool may be collected for laboratory testing.

#### How is HFMD and treated?

There is no specific treatment for HFMD. A health care provider may suggest medications to relieve symptoms Most people recover within 7–10 days.

How can people protect themselves against HFMD? The following steps can help prevent the spread of HFMD:

- Washing your hands frequently with soap and water, scrubbing your hands for at least 20 seconds
- Cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces and soiled items, including toys
- Avoiding close contact such as kissing, hugging, or sharing eating utensils with infected people

Should a person with HFMD stay at home from school/daycare?

A child who is sick with HFMD should stay at home if they have certain types of symptoms (such as open sores that cannot be covered).



CodeRed is an emergency notification system that enables local public safety personnel to notify residents and businesses of time-sensitive information, emergencies, or urgent alerts.


- Used by Lafayette County Sheriff's Office and Lafayette County Emergency Management to send emergency alerts.
- You MUST register yourself in order to receive these alerts
- Alerts can be about evacuation notices, missing persons, or inclement weather advisories, watches, and warnings.
- Alerts can be sent out via email, text, or phone which you choose when you set up your account.
- Registration is FREE!
- This system is precise enough to geotarget residents within an exact area of impact, so that only those impacted will be notified.
- You can register more than one phone number and email address for you location to receive CodeRed alerts.
- Download the CodeRed mobile App to receive alerts based on the geo-location of your phone.
   Traveling through other communities that use CodeRed You can receive emergency alerts about severe weather information.

The meeting was called to order by President Dee Paulson at 6:00 pm in the upper commons. The following board members were present Dee Paulson, Mindy Stauffacher, Cali Schliem, Clayton Rusessegger, Val Dunlavey and Jason Figi. Absent Jim Baumgartner. Also, present was administration of Willy Chmabers, Cory Milz, Tammy Zimmerman.

Motion by Fig and seconded by Stauffacher to consent to agenda which includes minutes from the August 2025 meeting, financial report as presented, agenda and posting of the agenda.

Administration reports: Chambers: We discussed addressing the ACH policy in the past at a Board meeting. After talking to Steve LaVallee from NEOIA and receiving clarification on the wording, we do not feel that a revision is needed. He clarified that the policy was addressing the agreement with the district's bank, which we do correctly through our current processes. Since you passed a motion allowing for ACH payments in general last month, the district will proceed with ACH payments in alignment with policies.

I have been placed on the WASDA Legislative Committee as a voting member for CESA #3. I will have to attend a couple of meetings this year for the role; most of the meetings are during conferences, which I typically attend.

I am running for the WIAA Advisory Council, which requires two meetings a year. The position became open after the last meeting. If I were to get voted in, I could turn it down if the Board is opposed to my serving in that capacity.

Currently, we have 5, possibly 6, students enrolled in Black Hawk Virtual School. We also have 4 students taking individual courses in the system.

I thank Melissa Pickett for her efforts to assist the Warrior Care operations. She has filled in on occasions when staff were not available. She has also made suggestions to help operations run more smoothly.

There have been `11 alternate open-enrollment applications in and 9 out. Out of the 11 in. A family chose to place one of their children in homeschooling. The parents said their goal was to get the child in a brick-and-mortar school in the next year or two. I will give you a more complete report on open enrollment once we have gone through the third Friday.

I received a call today asking about our 4K program from a Monroe School District staff member.

Board of Education Report: Question was asked for breakdown for football 28 Varsity players. Thanks to the South Wayne Fire Department for collecting items back to school items with fill the bus. Question about having summer to school for Freshman only to be able to better kick them off for school year.

Kevin Mullen from Baird gave a presentation about projection budgets for the current and future years of the district. Going as we currently into the next years we are going to continue to reduce fund balance. Mr. Mullen then discussed different structural options for referendum and considerations for the Board when deciding on an amount to ask the public to approve. First, he clarified that the state funding was dependent on the amount of money spent in the prior year, not on funds levied or whether it was a recurring or non-recurring referendum. He then discussed different ways to structure the amount requested. The Board can ask for a flat amount for a number of years (e.g. \$500,000 for 4 years) or step it up over the same time period (e.g. year 1 - 350,000, year 2- 450,000, year 3 - 550,000, year 4-\$650,000). The amount asked depends on the immediate funding needs and the desire, and the speed at which the Board wishes to rebuild the fund balance.

Money takers for football games add ticket takers to help in managing entrances. Block off one driveway entrance and have ticket takers together. This would help in managing people that are sitting in the parking lot that may not have paid.

Forms online for school year start. The district is looking to have all forms online with the ability to fill out and submit them by the beginning of the 2026-2027 school year. Mr. Chambers will investigate Skyward's capacity to perform those tasks. He will also investigate the cost of the service, if available.


